 Make sure your child sets an alarm to wake up on time for school. Make sure your child is ready for school in the morning: Do they know what letter day it is? Do they know how they will take classes that day? Synchronous?	 Make sure your child has a consistent learning space. Make sure your child is completing class work during school time: Synchronous learning: assignments will be completed with the teacher and sometimes will continue to the next day during asynchronous time. Asynchronous learning: assignments are to be completed during class time to benefit students as they have direct access to the teacher during their class period via Office Hours. COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS

College Planning: 12th Grade

Want to know if you're on track in the college application process? This checklist shows you what you should be doing, and when.

When you complete steps marked with * you may be eligible for College Board Opportunity Scholarships. Learn more at: cb.org/opportunity.

FALL

- □ Strengthen Your College List*: Meet with a counselor about your college choices and, if you've not yet done so, download college applications and financial aid forms. Make sure you have a balanced list of academic safety, fit, and reach schools. Plan to visit as many of these colleges as possible.
- ☐ Create a master list or calendar that includes:
 - Tests you'll take and their fees, dates, and registration deadlines
 - College application due dates
 - Required financial aid application forms and their deadlines (aid applications may be due before college applications)
 - Other materials you'll need (recommendations, transcripts, etc.)
 - · Your high school's application processing deadlines
- Ask a counselor to help you request a fee waiver if you can't afford application or test fees.
- ☐ Improve Your Score*: Many seniors retake the SAT in the fall. Additional coursework and practice with Official SAT Practice on Khan Academy* since your last test could help you boost your performance. Plus you already know what to expect on test day.
- Be sure to have your SAT scores sent to the colleges to which you are applying.

- Complete the FAFSA*: To apply for most financial aid, you'll need to complete the FAFSA. Oct. 1 is the first day you can file the FAFSA.
- Complete the CSS Profile: CSS Profile™ is an online application used by certain colleges and scholarship programs to determine eligibility for their aid dollars.
- □ Prepare early decision/early action or rolling admission applications as soon as possible. Nov. 1–15: Colleges may require test scores and applications between these dates for early decision admission.
- Ask a counselor or teacher for recommendations if you need them. Give each teacher or counselor an outline of your academic record and your extracurricular activities. For each recommendation, provide a stamped, addressed envelope and any college forms required.
- Write first drafts and ask teachers and others to read them if you're submitting essays. If you're applying for early decision, finish the essays for that application now.
- Apply to College*: Submit your applications to the schools that you want to attend.
- ☐ Ask counselors to send your transcripts to colleges. Give counselors the proper forms at least two weeks before the colleges require them.

WINTER

- Keep photocopies as you finish, and send your applications and essays.
- ☐ Give the correct form to your counselor if the college wants to see second-semester grades.
- ☐ Have your high school send a transcript—it is sent separately by mail to colleges if you apply online to colleges.

SPRING

- Keep active in school. If you are waitlisted, the college will want to know what you have accomplished between the time you applied and the time you learned of its decision.
- □ Visit your final college before accepting. You should receive acceptance letters and financial aid offers by mid- April. Notify your counselor of your choice. If you have questions about housing offers, talk to your counselor or call the college.
- ☐ Inform every college of your acceptance or rejection of the offer of admission and/or financial aid by May 1.
 Colleges cannot require your deposit or your commitment to attend before May 1. Talk to your counselor or adviser if you have questions.
- ☐ Send your deposit to one college only.
- □ Take any AP® Exams. Show what you've learned in your AP classes. A successful score could even earn you credit, advanced placement, or both in college.

- Waitlisted by a college? If you intend to enroll if you are accepted, tell the admission director your intent and ask how to strengthen your application. Need financial aid? Ask whether funds will be available if you're accepted.
- Work with a counselor to resolve any admission or financial aid problems.
- Ask your high school to send a final transcript to your college.
- □ Review your financial aid awards: Not all financial aid awards are the same, so it's important to choose the aid package that's best for you and your family. Be sure to note what you have to do to continue receiving financial aid from year to year, and how your aid might change in future years.

Ouring the COVID-19 Crisis, how have colleges and universities adapted admissions?

Careful consideration of current circumstances has allowed for some accommodations when it comes to admissions. All colleges and universities have changed the way they are deciding whether they are accepting a student. More emphasis will be placed on:

- Mid-Year Grades
- College Essays
- Teacher
 Recommendations

Colleges have also shifted to a test-optional approach. Which means they are not requiring standardized tests such as SATs and ACTs.

When applying to a specific college, students should contact the Admissions Office to review other requirements, as necessary.

School Counselors will be at Participation in Government classes every Wednesday to address specific questions and concerns.

FINANCIAL AID TIMELINE



As you progress through your senior year, we hope this financial aid timeline will help you become familiar with the aid application process. Dates may vary, so check with your campuses of interest to confirm requirements and deadlines. Apply for financial aid early and online, if possible.

Senior Year

July (or earlier - in your Junior year)

- Begin to search for scholarships. The best place to find scholarship information is at your colleges of interest, parents' places of employment, local libraries, high schools, and the web. Websites to start your search:

- Create a calendar of all deadlines: admissions; scholarships and financial aid applications.

August

> Start applying to colleges.

September

- Start a financial aid folder to keep all financial aid documents organized. Information you should collect for your financial aid folder:
 - Your social security number
 - Your parents' social security numbers and dates of birth
 - Your parents' marital status
 - Tax returns for you and your parents
 - W2s for you and your parents
 - Bank, stock, real estate, and business records for you and your parents
 - Your driver's license number
 - Your alien registration number (for non-U.S. citizens)
- Create an FSA ID for you and your parent at fafsa.gov

October

- > File the FAFSA now at fafsa.gov.
- > If you need a paper application, call 1800.4 FED AID.

October (continued)

- New York State residents should apply for the New York State. Tuition Assistance Program (TAP). Use the link on the FAFSA confirmation page to go to TAP on the Web. If you need more information, visit www.hesc.nv.sov.
- If you are a non-New York State resident or an undocumented student, visit www.hesc.ny.gov/dream to determine your eligibility for state aid under the NYS DREAM Act.

November

- > If you have completed the FAFSA.
 - Watch your email for a notice from the U.S. Department of Education with a link to access your Student Aid Report (SAR).
 - Call 1,800.4 FED.AID, If you have not received your SAR.
- If you have not completed the FAFSA, do so now at fafsa gov.

December - April

- New York State residents should apply for the Excelsion Scholarship. For more information regarding application dates and deadlines, visit www.hesc.ny.gov/excelsion.
- If you qualify for state aid under the NYS DREAM Act, complete the DREAM Act application. For more information regarding application dates and deadlines, visit www.hesc.ny.gov/dream.
- After you receive your college acceptances, watch for financial aid award letters.
- Advise financial aid offices, at the colleges you have listed on the FAFSA, of any unusual circumstances that may affect your family's ability to pay for college, such as unemployment or unusual medical expenses.
- Compare financial aid packages from different schools and choose your college.

May

By May 1, notify colleges of your enrollment decision.
 Accept both offers of admission and financial aid at your college of choice.

June - July


Apply for federal student loans, if applicable
